### **Disaster Management Manual**



#### Introduction

This manual is intended to provide information and guidance to tourists in case of emergency situations while visiting Kagawa Prefecture.

Japan is one of the most seismically active and typhoon-prone countries in the world. Especially earthquakes occur at anytime and anywhere. Tohoku area was hit by a massive earthquake and tsunami back in March 2011, causing devastating damage. A large earthquake may happen even in Kagawa Prefecture. In addition, the area is affected by typhoon and heavy rain.

To protect yourself and your family/friends, please read this book carefully to prepare yourself for emergencies.

#### **Outline of the App**

#### **Basic Features**

 The push-enabled information alert app (data and content is delivered to users automatically) notifies users of disaster information provided by the Japan Meteorological Agency.

#### **Supported Languages**

- English, Chinese (Simplified/Traditional), Korean, and Japanese

#### **Information Offered**

#### **Earthquakes**

 Up to ten previous earthquake information (epicenter map, depth of hypocenter, magnitude, etc.) can be checked here.

#### **Weather Warnings**

 Special weather warnings and weather warnings of a set location are displayed here. Correspondent action list at the time of issuing the warning is also available.

#### **Volcanic Warnings**

- It offers information related to volcanic warnings currently in place.

#### **Heat illness Warnings**

- The risk level of heat illness of a set location is displayed here.

#### **Medical Institutions**

- Japan National Tourism Organization offers information related to medical institutions accepting international tourists.

#### Transi

- Here, you can check the latest service status and transfer information.

#### Evacuation advice/ instruction etc.

 Evacuation advisory and warnings issued by local governments are displayed. (Japanese only)

#### **Learning Materials**

- Descriptions of warnings and first aid procedures are offered here.

#### **Communication Cards**

- A variety of useful questions in case of disaster is displayed in multiple languages (English, Chinese, Korean, and Japanese) to facilitate communication.

#### **Emergency Contacts**

- Precautions on calling the emergency numbers 110 and 119, as well as address and telephone number of the embassy of a country set beforehand are displayed here.
- Clicking on the telephone number will take you to a dial pad to make a call.

#### Links

- The links to websites where you can collect important information (contact information of embassies, etc.) in a time of disaster are offered here.




#### Types of Disasters - Earthquake-

Japan is a seismically active country. Earthquakes occur at anytime and anywhere.

A large earthquake may happen even in Kagawa Prefecture. Please read this book carefully to prepare yourself.

#### Large earthquakes that may hit Kagawa



There are several tectonic plates (i.e.very thick, large rock plates) on the earth's crust. Earthquakes and tsunami occur when these plates move.

Kagawa is situated in the northeast of Shikoku above the Eurasia Plate. The Philippine Sea plate is slipping under the Eurasian plate in the Pacific Ocean located south of Shikoku. There is a large trench (i.e.trough) in between these two plates known as the Nankai Trough. The earthquakes occurred here are called Nankai Trough earthquakes.

In addition, if the area is hit by an epicentral earthquake, there is great potential for more devastating damage.

#### What to do at first

#### If you are in a hotel/ryokan inn:



Cover your head with a pillow, cushion, etc. Take cover under a desk or table.



Open the door. You cannot evacuate if the door is damaged.



Do not go outside immediately. Look around you carefully and evacuate to a safer place such as evacuation shelter.

#### If you are outside:




Cover your head with a bag to protect yourself from falling objects.



Take cover under a desk or table. Cover your head with a bag. Follow the instructions of shop personnel to evacuate.



Roads near mountain and river might be affected. Evaluate immediately and stay away.



Tsunamis or storm surges are coming. Evacuate to higher ground, away from the shore.



If you are inside the elevator, press all the floor buttons. Once the doors open, exit immediately.



If you are in a car, train, or bus, follow staff instructions to evacuate.



#### Types of Disasters - Typhoons and Heavy Rain-



Japan is hit by dozens of typhoons every year from July to October. In Kagawa, most typhoons come from the south-western side of the prefecture.

Typhoons bring strong winds and heavy rain, which can cause landslides, flooding, inundation, and storm surges. You must be very careful during a

In recent years, there is an increasing number of localized torrential rains that drop enormous amounts of water in a short period of time. In July 2018, torrential rains caused significant damage to a nearby prefecture.

#### What to do at first

#### What you should do promptly in case of a typhoon or heavy rain



It is dangerous to go near mountains and the sea. Please stay away.



If you are outside, there is a risk of injury from falling or getting hit by an object blown off by a powerful wind. Please stay inside.



Be sure to check the TV or the Internet for the latest information. Think carefully if it is safer to evacuate or stay at a hotel and decide what to do.

#### How to evacuate



Put on sneakers because it is dangerous to walk in boots or barefoot. Wear gloves if any.



Do not evacuate alone. Stick together in groups as much as possible when you evacuate.



Watch carefully not to fall into a hole when you walk on a street. Always protect your head from flying objects.

#### **Emergency exit signs**



#### Emergency exit signs mostly with a green background

An emergency exit is marked with this sign with a green background.

In the event of an earthquake or a fire, evacuate through a door marked with this sign.



#### Emergency exit signs mostly with a white background

This emergency exit sign mainly with a white background indicates the direction of an emergency exit such as hallways and access aisles.

#### What to expect after an earthquake:



#### **A** Tsunami

When an earthquake occurs under the sea, it can cause tsunamis. People near the shore or river must pay careful attention.



#### Landslides

Careful attention is required if you are near steep mountains or cliffs.



#### A Fire

Fire can break out after an earthquake. In areas where there are many buildings, fires may spread throughout the city.



#### A Falling objects

Objects such as furniture, computers, and light fixtures can collapse or fall. Stepping on broken glass can also cause injury. If you are outside, pay attention to vending machines, walls, signs, etc.



#### Building collapses

Houses or buildings may collapse to cause injuries.

- Gas, water, and electricity services may be suspended.
- Mobile phones and the Internet may become inaccessible.
- Roads may be closed due to damages.
- Trains, airplanes, and buses may be out of service.

#### **Seismic intensity scale**

Magnitudes measures the size of an earthquake. The seismic intensity scale indicates how much the earth shakes. The scale runs from intensity one to seven.

Seismic intensity 7	Impossible to stand. Most large objects collapse or become displaced. The ground is distorted by large cracks, and landslides take place.		
Seismic intensity 6 upper	Impossible to stand. The walls and tiles of a house sustain damages. Outside fences or walls may collapse.		
Seismic intensity 6 Lower	Difficult to keep standing. Doors may become wedged shut. Furniture moves or falls. Many houses collapse.		

	Seismic intensity 5 Upper	Difficult to walk. Most objects collapse or fall. It is difficult to drive a car.
	Seismic intensity 5 Lower	Everyone is frightened and wants to hold onto an object. Windows break or fall.
	Seismic intensity 4	Most people are startled. People can notice shakes while walking and asleep. Lights wing significantly. Dishes and glasses rattle.
,	Seismic i ntensity 3	Perceptible to everyone indoors. Some people can notice shakes whether walking or sleeping.






#### What to expect after typhoon and heavy rain:



#### **△** Mudflows

Rainwater washes soil and rocks from mountains down a slope.



#### Landslides

Rainwater causes the already-unstable ground to loosen to flow downwards.



#### Landslips

A mountain collapses, causing soil and rocks to fall suddenly.



#### Flooding

Heavy rains cause the water level of rivers and reservoirs to rise and back up into roads.



#### Inundation

Water flows into houses and buildings.



#### Storm surge

A typhoon causes the sea level to rise.

#### **Advisories and Warnings**

#### Heavy rain warning (Advisory)

Watch out for landslides and inundation caused by heavy rainfall.

#### Flood warning (Advisory)

Flooding causes rising rivers and reservoirs. Stay away from rivers and reservoirs.



#### Storm warning/ Strong wind advisory

Winds are very strong. Watch out for flying objects. Stay indoors.



#### High waves warning (Advisory)

Waves are high. Avoid the sea.
